Money Makes a Difference Essay Winner

I am a recovering coupon addict, bargain hunter, and deal finder.

Before participating in The Women's Resource's financial coaching program, I would spend money on frivolous things, and money would drain like water from my bank account.

Enter Geana, my financial coach, and budgeting became my new favorite game! She had me put money in all the places - 401K, HSA, High Yield Savings Account, emergency fund, and even a travel fund making sure to get that employer match, paying myself first, and getting my finances in order. Now, watching those savings grow is way more exciting than the thrill of finding a bargain! From paying down my debt to working on improving my credit score and saving for my next trip, good deals and additional debt did not stand a chance. I have got quite a way to go but know that with each dollar earned, saved, and invested, I will surely get there.

Through the program, I have started to budget and track my monthly expenditures, cooking meals at home, shifting my mindset from buying to building up my savings and investments, and experiencing what Einstein calls the 8th Wonder of the World: compound interest. With the money I have saved, I have been able to fix my car, pay down debt, and visit my 96-year-old grandma in Hong Kong! Thank you, savings and travel fund bucket!

A few of my coworkers were lamenting their financial situation; one was in the negative each month, while the other had some debt and was living a life of excess. I asked them if they budgeted, and they said they did not. We looked at The Women's Resource page together and discussed budgeting, having a financial coach for accountability, and best of all, that it was a free resource - no additional cost! Since then, my coworker has done a complete 180; she now has extra money at the end of the month through budgeting, meal prep, and reprioritizing things in her life. The other is working on it as well, though at a slower pace, and I know that she will soon be meeting her financial goals too. I am happy to have been a part of their journeys!

As an advocate for financial empowerment and having experienced a financial transformation, I am happy to share my story and introduce others to The Women's Resource and working with a financial coach. It is really heartwarming to be part of another's transition from financial turmoil to having surplus funds through small changes.

RISE! Money Makes a Difference Essay Winner

In a family of six, I am the middle child. It was always hard for me growing up, either sharing with my older brother or younger sister. We lived in a trailer home for 13 years with my grandparents until we could lease our own home. My dad would work endlessly as an 18-wheeler driver, but it did not matter what he did - the job just was not stable. On top of that, we never really saved money even though we wanted to. It was always, "Oh, your dad's truck broke down. We need to take out money from our savings," or "We need to make truck payments." I eventually picked up on the same bad habits; when I was younger, I would spend all my money on one trip to the mall.

My dream school is Columbia University, and I have the grades to get me there, but what concerns me is if I have the money for it. When I tell my family about it, they tell me, "You can do whatever you put your mind to. Just get on those books and get the

scholarships." Why is it that the only way I can go to Columbia is if I get scholarships? Why can't it be with my own money? It was not until I joined RISE! that I learned if I save my money now, I do not have to heavily rely on others for money. What I did not know after joining the program was that RISE! would change my habits for the better.

My ninth grade RISE! instructor, Keishawna Jolivette, always talked about money and how saving it is a big deal. She made me think about my family's decisions on money, which made me realize that I do not want to handle money like they do. Additionally, Jennifer Flores, a guest speaker, came and talked to us, which led me to act toward my money goal I had set earlier that year. Jennifer talked to us about how we should save money and put it in the bank. She explained that the money saved can collect more money instead of just having it in the house with no reward. RISE! inspired me to save my money.

When I had a quinceañera and got over \$4,000, my first decision was to open a savings account and put \$3,000 in it. I have also set up a savings system for myself. When I get money, I keep half of the total and put the rest in my savings account. Both of my parents are proud of my smart decisions and how I am creating my own future. I have talked to my younger sister about how it is so important to save money and how it can benefit her in the future.

I am so glad that I joined RISE!. I will carry the lessons with me for the rest of my life ${}^{\circ}$

WHO WE SERVE

The Women's Resource reaches **over 2,000 women and girls annually** who stand outside the financial mainstream. Through our network of **over 40 partner agencies**, we deliver accessible financial education and coaching to some of Houston's most vulnerable populations.

THE CHALLENGE WE ADDRESS

ECONOMIC DISPARITIES

In Harris County, women earn just

84 cents for every dollar earned by men, with Black and Hispanic women facing the most significant wage gaps relative to white male earnings.

FINANCIAL INSECURITY

Two-thirds of Houston-area residents lack enough savings to sustain themselves for three months, creating vulnerability to financial emergencies.



DECLINING ECONOMIC MOBILITY

Young women who grew up in low-income households in Harris County experienced a **2.1% decrease in economic mobility** when comparing those born in 1978 and 1992.

POVERTY'S IMPACT

Nearly one in four children in Harris County lives in poverty, creating barriers that can echo throughout their lives.

OUR APPROACH

We recognize that financial empowerment looks different for everyone. About half of our clients are employed, while others are students, job seekers, or managing life transitions. We meet clients where they are through:

- In-person classes at partner locations
- Virtual sessions for increased accessibility
- Public classes open to all women
- One-on-one coaching for personalized support
- Classes and financial coaching offered in English and Spanish

We are building a foundation for lasting economic empowerment in the Houston community through strategic partnerships and our evidence-based model

84% of our clients fall within the **low-to-moderate** income range.

Many are from **ALICE households** (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed), representing **32% of Harris County residents**.



REVENUE SOURCE BREAKDOWN


